70 motorcycles now on display – Donations from across the US

The most recent and distant donation came all the way from Plainville, CT! Lou at Ro-Brand Products, Inc. sent 50 lbs of packaged automotive fasteners and specialties including hose clamps, electrical connectors, etc. We re very grateful for these essentials that will be useful in repairs and restorations. The longest item for our collection was the 15-foot 1930s Old Town canoe donated in memory of **Robert** L. Maddox by his daughter Virginia Maddox Hankins. Bob Maddox was band director in Cisco, Texas and in appreciation for his dedication to the school and his students, the parents presented this canoe to him. His daughter reports that he spent many enjoyable hours fishing in the peace and quiet of local lakes. He brought it when he moved north to Montana to his orchard (1960 to 1978) bordering the Yellow Bay Clubhouse. Bob continued enjoying it summers on Flathead Lake. Winter hasn't really come to our valley yet and the calendar says it's almost spring. No snow and fairly mild temperatures have allowed us to work on several outside projects thanks in part to volunteers **David Bosley** and **Scott Perry.**

Included in the restorations or fix-ups are horse and tractor drawn implements, two visible gas pumps with the 10-gallon gravity-feed glass cylinder on top; a fairly rare John Deere grain elevator, and our Mak-a-Tractor. After 44 years of owning a 1924 Model T Ford tractor attachment, I decided it was time to complete it. Almost a dozen different companies sold various styles of units to convert a farmer's T Ford into a tractor for field work and then he could take it off and put the rear wheels and tires back on for normal use.











Jim Burrowes donated miscellaneous vintage tools, auto parts, a picnic table, shelving and other useful items.

It lived long enough to have hair. Howard put it in a corked test tube preserved with alcohol. It now resides on our 1928 physics and biology lab table in the schoolhouse.
