Soviet Escapee Feels "the Spirit of Freedom"

International visitors especially appreciate our mission, "To restore a belief in America and the free enterprise concept guaranteed by the Constitution."

A motorcyclist who was a policeman in the Czech Republic toured Miracle of America and said, "I feel the spirit of freedom here." He went out to his saddlebags, returned, and donated the Czech police patch shown.

The couple especially enjoyed our freedom message as most foreign born folks do. Joe was born in communist controlled Romania, but the family escaped when he was 11 years old. He later became a citizen, attended West Point and joined the Special Forces because he felt he could do the most damage to the communist in that organization.



While we were visiting, his partner, Jamaican born Shelly – now a US citizen – exclaimed, "I love America."

It often takes those that grew up under worse conditions to appreciate what we have in America. It warmed my heart to spend time with this couple. Bitter Sweet Moment

This 1870 concert harp was my first wife, Joanne's, and she learned to play it in high school. If I had a rough day in the field or the shop she would play it for me to soothe my soul, much like David played the harp for King Saul when he was troubled.

It has been on display in the music

section since we started the museum 36 years ago, only to leave once when granddaughter, Dez, played it at Joanne's memorial service in 2012.

Joanne had willed it to Dez who has become an accomplished harpist on a regular harp, but this pedaled concert

harp will enhance her playing even more.

So while I am sorry to see it go, I am glad for my granddaughter to take it to her home in Arkansas.

The other part of the sweet is that subject to board approval, Dez will serve as my Chief Executive Officer successor! She would move to Polson in the summer of 2025 and work as my assistant full time until I am no longer able to fill the role. It would be a great relief to know the legacy we have worked so hard to build will be in such capable hands. You will meet her at upcoming events. When she was here in July, she helped us transform displays throughout the museum.

Dez has a degree in Computer Science from the University of Washington and owns her own company as a digital transitionist. We really need help to bring the behind-the-scenes museum work into the 21st century. In addition to her expertise with computer systems, she also has sharp interpersonal skills and is a talented leader. Particularly organizing people to cooperate in group events. She is working on a degree in welding and taking courses on Museum Management. The future looks bright for the Miracle of America Museum. Not only will I have family nearby, but will be able to listen to the harp again.

She and her husband will be looking for either property to build on, or a home in our area.

MISCELLANEOUS DONATIONS

Donations this last quarter were as diverse as the museum and I won't have the room to list all.

Bill Carroll donated some beautiful Schnitzmeyer photos of 1916 era Polson. You'll have to visit the museum to view them as I don't think they will show up well here; **Melodee Seelye** donated her late husband Tim's beautifully built radio controlled model of a WWII B25 Bomber with a 7-ft wingspan.



We have owned the 1880s Montana hearse since the late 1980s and Gil has been wanting to find manikin horses and dress harness ever since. A donation of dress harness by brother-in-law, **Gary Abbey** was incentive enough to double our efforts to find a pair of life size manikin horses and finally the internet paid off. Gil had them shipped from Texas to Missoula and saved \$500 freight by picking them up in Missoula. The harness itself is pretty historic as Gary joined other Montanans during the 1964 Territorial Centennial and 75 years as statehood on a wagon train drive all the way to New York City. They rode the train back east and stopped at 18 cities along the way and did parades and shows on the way to the world fair at which the 2nd day was designated "Montana Days".


Gary and wife Francis also used the same harness hitched to a wagon with hay bales to give day rides in Glacier National Park.

Jim Pomajevich donated a frame for the missing dashboard on the hearse and pledged to cover the costs of having it correctly restored with leather. We have sent it to Pennsylvania and are eager to install it. It would have protected the driver from the horse's hooves kicking debris and other matter from the road. We had hoped to display this and other funerary items in a wing on a village church, but it seems there is no grant money available for that. Anyone want to build one for the museum? We already have a large bell, stained glass windows, etc. While the church would be nondenominational, a prominent plaque could be affixed to a donor or as a memorial.

Chief picker, **Howard Hudson** has a keen eye for unusual items that many pickers would pass over. How many of you remember the small openers for Cheez Whiz or Heinz 57 products? A small wrench for a military signal corp apparatus and a wrench for an emergency spark plug operated tire pump round out this little grouping.
