Chief picker, **Howard Hudson** always finds interesting items, and our Glacier Park collection keeps growing. Some of it I included in an article for their centennial a few years back. You may find it under "Crown of the Continent" and our museum

name.

Bob Day brought in two bayonets, circa Civil War and earlier. His wife, Donna always fills in as school marm during Live History Days, which will be July 20-21 this year. Nancy Van Zant donated a silver plated

clarinet and case. It

was well used, so some of the plating had worn off, but that gives it character and has fit nicely in our music display.

her late husband's Army uniform. Jerry had been a friend, and I had the honor in assisting with the Veteran Honor Guard at his memorial. Virginia came from a large family on a farm on the same section as my



grandparents in Mountain View. Her father worked on our farm for many years. We have a large display of her grandfather's effects who served during the Spanish American War.

Ray Burton again donated some nice items including keys, one a railroad switch key from the *Atchison/Topeka/Santa Fe*. For those unaccustomed to railroads, a switch was a heavy long handled device with which you would switch the rails,

sending the train onto a siding or another line. They had to be padlocked to prevent accidental or purposeful sabotage, causing a collision, or directing a train to a wrong destination. We have two antique switches in front of the train

station and another on our short line in the east yard. Ray also donated Boy Scout items. The 1936 handbook



shows Mercurochrome being applied to a scraped knee. How many remember that the treatment stung worse than the pain of the wound.

Jackie Gran brought us a nice home use blackboard. That fits right in with today's emphasis on home schooling, and like the McGuffey readers and the Dick and Jane books of the last century, taught millions to read, but none to sin.

A nice Christmas present came from my cousin **Millie Mangels** who

It is uncommon to have a handle which also kept the cover from sliding off if you were transporting it to a church social which I can picture her doing after she had hand-churned the butter from their own cow's milk. We can't imagine where she might have bought it in this area. Both grandparents came from northern Germany to America and by rail straight to Kalispell, then boat to the Polson area where they homesteaded.

Mike Brooks, in going through family effects discovered unique items

and gifted a cute little 1884 patent date alarm clock. I wish there were still clock repairman that could do a little repair. He also gave us the most complete traveling shaving kit I've seen. These were often given out to regular customers or employees as appreciation gifts.

Beverly Drebes sold her place and donated several kitchen items including a cherry pitter, pea sheller, grain grinder, etc. You'd think that with our having 27 cherry pitters, we would have all variations, but this adds yet a different model.

1964 Tragic Flood Documented

Mike Brooks also brought a Great Falls Tribune Booklet loaded with photos of the 1964 flood.

I knew it flooded part of Kalispell, but hadn't realized it had taken over twenty lives and did catastrophic damage around the Great Falls area. That spring, **Glenn Timm** flew me and another friend over Flathead Lake and you could see a stream of mud in the current flow from the inlet all the way down to the Polson Bridge.
